- 6. Budget and Requisitions 2020 attached are three budget documents for consideration: a draft 2020 operating, 2020 Requisitions and 2020 2022 Operating Budget Plan. The draft 2020 operating budget includes reference to the 2019 approved budget and actuals (at yearend 2019*). The 2020 Requisitions are based on the draft 2020 budget as presented and apportions the costs based on lot counts (as provided by each village) as per the operating guidelines. The 2020-2022 Operating Plan is a strategic plan to help members plan their own internal 3-year operating plans. Overall the 2020 budget projects a slight decrease in overall requisitions from 2019 and no significant core operating increase over the next three years**. (Approve 2020 Budget, 2020 Requisitions, and 2020-2022 Operating Plan, as presented or with amendments)

Note: Just to clarify a few items on the budget while you review:

- * The 2019 Budget shows a surplus, which is a bit misleading. There was a "core" surplus, however there were two significant "special motions" passed after the budget which resulted in bringing in more reserves (to cover those unbudgeted costs). So, I suggest reading the 2019 actuals as follows: "SVLSACE moved \$4,416 out of reserves to cover FCM, Rural Education Symposium and the Regional Meeting and returned \$2,972 to reserves at the end of the year after accounting for expenses." This corresponds with the approximately \$1,400 decrease in the bank balance year-to-year. We can discuss more during the meeting just a bit difficult to reflect on the single sheet format we are using for the budget.
- ** The 2020-2022 Operating Plan does show a spike in expenses for 2021. This is to account for the next anticipated time SVLSACE may need to host a Regional Meeting. We have increased the budget estimate for that and added additional annual reserve

contributions so that in 2021 we can cover that "extra cost" from reserves – rather than a spike in member requisitions.

- 7. Alberta Invasive Species Council, 2020 Conference Attached is some background on the upcoming AISC 2020 Conference. The Conference is being held in Lacombe, AB on March 24th and 25th, 2020 and some detail on the topics being discussed are included. The cost of registration is \$164.00, and expenses would include travel (384km) and accommodation (hotel for 1 night). Chairman Poulin, who is also Water Quality Committee rep, would like consideration to attend this conference on behalf of SVLSACE. (Authorize attendance of Chairman Poulin at the Alberta Invasive Species Council, 2020 Conference).
